

A NOTE FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT

Greetings fellow Trout Lake campers:

According to the calendar, spring is officially here but as I'm writing this it is -2 outside with a bitter wind chill. The snow birds are heading home and many camps are being opened up for another season. Some of the hardier souls have been at the lake all winter. I'm sure I'm not the only one looking forward to seeing warmer days soon.

During the winter I took the opportunity to attend a couple meetings of the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations (FOCA). FOCA is a not-for-profit organization formed in 1963 to represent property owners on issues that affect our lakes and rivers. Their mission is to protect thriving and sustainable waterfronts across Ontario. Trout Lake Campers' Association (as well as each individual member of TLCA) is a member of FOCA. They have a very comprehensive website and I encourage you to check it out at foca.on.ca for information on water quality in Ontario, climate change, electricity pricing and more. CREATION OF EMAIL CONTACT LIST

As a result of the problems getting the word out around the proposed tax increases, there was a discussion at the Board meeting about setting up an email group.

The Board would like to set up "contact areas" around the lake, each with it's own co-ordinator. As a sub-committee of the Board, information would be sent out to each co-ordinator, who would then forward the email to their respective groups. Information coming back to the co-ordinators could be funneled back to the board.

This would allow us to reach most of our members very quickly, if necessary, and avoid the issues encountered when trying to send emails to large groups, using the limited internet capabilities at the lake. This could be used for share information such as the tax issue, or perhaps even be used in emergencies.

ENVIRONMENT & FORESTRY REPORT—Bob Nikolic, Director



Greetings to all Campers!


On the environmental front we have received 2015 Total Phosphorus, Calcium and Secchi disk values. You can see the sampling results on the graphs in this bulletin. Calcium values are pretty steady over last 6 years averaging about 205 mg/l (milligrams per liter) which is well above the amount required for healthy crayfish and other aquatic organism's populations which depend on Calcium for survival.


The total Phosphorus and Secchi disc values show that from the beginning of sampling in 1990 to now we have had three distinct periods. From 1990 to 2005 TP content shows very wide range from 6.0 to 10.5 μ g/l (micrograms per liter) averaging relatively high value of 8 μ g/l. This was probably and partially due to campers and others not being aware that the Phosphorus in cleaning products of the day was accumulating in water bodies. The period from 2007 to 2012 was characterized by the lowest Phosphorus content in the lake, averaging about 6.3 μ g/l and coincided with several dry years and low water level probably limiting TP input into the lake. There is also the fact that many new sewage treatment facilities were and are being installed by campers. For the last three years average TP is about 7 μ g/l and this appears to be our normal value for a normal year. It is a very good average indicating good water quality.


I want to remind everyone that TP levels over 15 μ g/I are **the cause of blue-green algal blooms**. Our Secchi readings are about 4 meters, indicating very good water transparency. As usual we will be taking water samples and Secchi readings in May and are also planning to measure dissolved oxygen in the lake. This should improve our knowledge of water quality required for healthy fish population.

As far as forestry is concerned there was no harvesting activity on the north shore of the lake last winter. The annual schedule had a plan for harvesting block #2010-075 north of Lafreniere Road but that has been postponed for this coming winter. The annual schedule for 2016/16 also includes Lahaie's #10-090 block close to the power line on the south shore and possibly Lahaie's #2010-069 block in the vicinity of Zettler Bay Road. I will be examining the annual schedule in detail and have maps as usual on display during the Picnic.


FISHERY REPORT—Larry Hewitt

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



Moose Facts

- Moose are the largest member of the deer family.
- The flap of skin that hangs beneath a moose's throat is called a bell.
- Only males have a rack of antlers. They are flattened



- Each year, antlers are shed in November or December and another, slightly larger set begin to grow the next midsummer.
- Moose live in every Canadian province.
- Moose are very good swimmers and can easily swim 16 kilometres.
- Moose can run faster than 50 kilometres per hour.
- Having poor eyesight, moose rely on their keen sense of smell.
- A male moose is called a bull and a female moose is called a cow.
- The word moose comes from the Algonquin word *mooswa*, which means "twig-eater."
- Moose eat willow, birch and aspen twigs, horsetail, sedges, roots, pond weeds and grasses, leaves, twigs, buds and the bark of some woody plants, as well as lichens, aquatic plants and some of the taller herbaceous land plants.
- Moose can feed under water.
- Moose can dive more than five metres for food on a lake bottom.
- It is estimated that there are between 500,000 and 1 million moose in Canada, although a significant decline has been experienced in Manitoba and eastward into Ontario. The causes are unclear.
- Male moose weigh over 550 kg (1200 lb) on average, and females are often more than 400 kg (880 lb). Calves weigh around 15 kg (33 lb) at birth but quickly increase in size. Height at the shoulders generally ranges between 2.1 to 2.3 m (6.5 to 7.5 feet). Only the males have antlers, averaging 160 cm (63 in.) across and 20 kg (45 lb) in weight with a broad, flattened palmate shape fringed in up to 30 times.
- They can run up to 35 miles (56 kilometers) an hour over short distances, and trot steadily at 20 miles (32 kilometers) an hour.



Charlie and I saw at least 20 moose during our drives this winter. While some may have been the same moose, it's still indicative of a healthy moose population.

Having encountered many moose in my daily commutes to Sudbury, they are quite impressive, when coming towards me while I'm sitting in my car!

AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDED June 30, 2015

On Sept.15, 2015, the Audit Committee (see list below) reviewed the books and records of TLCASD for the six months ended June 30, 2015. This review included the books and records and bank statements for both the lottery account and the general account. We checked that all revenue and expenses were recorded correctly including allocation to the correct category. This was done by matching the ledger, bank records, deposit slips and receipts. We also checked the bank reconciliation. At this time we found that everything was in good standing and all items were accounted for and reconciled. The TLCASD Treasurer, Dave Moxham, continues to do an excellent job of keeping the records in order.

The next review will be conducted in the spring of 2016 to review the books and records for the year ended December 31, 2015.



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COTTAGE WATCH Program

We were approached about setting up a "Cottage Watch" program on the lake. This is similar to "neighbourhood watch" and is a program co-ordinated by the O.P.P. The board felt each area of the lake should take this on to organ-

ize amongst neighbours to keep an eye on each other's properties. Many of you do this already. This program would just formalize it. The O.P.P. will make presentations to groups interested in setting this up.

We do have a manual available to assist with organizing. We'll see that it is posted on the www.tlcasd.ca website so it can be easily accessed.

In light of a series of break-ins which occurred at properties on Owl's Nest Road, in March, this might be a good idea.

In addition, we recommend installation of game cameras in discrete ways, on your property. These can be very effective in showing who is coming and going.



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Blast from the Past!

It's a 1963 Gale Buccaneer 25 hp. When I bought the Crestliner in 1972 I sold the Gale to Don McKibbon.


The dock was the second one we built and was made of used concrete forms from some construction project in Sudbury. The wooden dock cleats were "whittled" with an axe and nailed to the dock.

This view is important to me because there is no power line to look at across the lake.



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PROPERTY TAXATION

As many of you are aware, there have been ongoing discussions with the Council and staff of the Municipality of French River with regard to the proposed tax increase for 2016. The increase is in the neighbourhood of 9 percent. This is on top of the 16 percent increase last year.

Many of you received emails from your friends and other campers urging you to write letters and emails to the municipality opposing, or asking for justification for the proposed increase. We thank all of you who participated in this process. About 50 residents attended the public presentation held in Alban on March 16th, where we had the opportunity to ask questions of the councilors and CAO. Councilors certainly knew we were unhappy with the proposals.

To date, Council has arranged for KPMG to do an operational audit of how the municipality operates, day-to-day. This is expected to take several months. Our job, when it is complete is to ensure the municipality implements any recommended changes, cuts, or improvements to how it operates.

In the interim, Council has approved the budget at 2015 levels, to enable the first interim tax bills to go out. Any increase will be reflected on the later bills. The increases proposed fall mostly under the Operations budget and include large equipment purchases such as a truck for the fire-chief, trucks for Public Works, a float to transport heavy equipment, and so on. The bulk of the operations budget is being directed towards road improvements, although a prioritized list has not yet been seen. We certainly need major road improvements.

Many of us are pushing the municipality to look into an "area rating system" whereby taxes are allocated based upon the services a property does or does not have. For example, properties on Trout Lake have very minimal access to fire service, don't use municipal water and wastewater, the cemetery and so on. Therefore, our taxes for certain services should be reduced. In addition, there have been pushes for more user pay instead of general tax increases which hit waterfront owners especially hard.

Specific information on the proposed budget is posted on the <u>frenchriver.ca</u> website, under Tre asurer. Please be diligent in familiarizing yourself with the information, and participate in the process.

FOCA's Property Tax Position – OVERVIEW

Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations (FOCA) advocates for fair property taxation on behalf of waterfront residential property taxpayers in Ontario.

* NEW * For the 2016 tax year, your deadline to file a Request for Reconsideration (RfR) will depend on the date you receive your property assessment notice. The previous deadline (March 31 of each year) NO LONGER APPLIES. (Your actual deadline will be noted on your property assessment notice. For the territorial districts of Nipissing, Sudbury & Manitoulin it is Tuesday, August 23rd).

MPAC presented a 2016 Property Tax update to the FOCA Spring Seminar on March 5, 2016. A copy of this presentation can be made available to FOCA Members (note that all TLCA members are FOCA members. If interested, please contact the FOCA office.

FOCA's position on the Ontario residential property tax system

"Downloading" by the Province onto municipalities, and hence property owners in Ontario, is higher than all the rest of Canada. This inordinate local funding burden amplifies the unfairness inherent when property value is the sole determinant of how much an individual who pays for a lengthy list of municipal obligations. FOCA believes the provincial government must hasten and broaden the provincial role in financially supporting social services through provincial income taxes, which has only partially been addressed in the recommendations of the 2008 Provincial Municipal Fiscal and Service Delivery Review.

The use of current value assessments (CVA), as a means to calculate property owners' payments for municipal services received, continues to unfairly distribute social costs. There are precedents in other North American jurisdictions for a fairer process, acknowledging that there are municipal services that should not be paid for solely on the basis of the value of one's property. To use pure CVA to calculate tax obligations amounts to a tax on unrealized capital gains.

Failing to address the shortcomings within the current process will contribute to instability in many Ontario communities, forcing the untimely disposition of family assets. This is only one unfortunate if unintended consequence from the current instable and unpredictable property tax system. It is FOCA's contention that the Province must forthwith take concrete steps to address the instability and unpredictability of property taxation in Ontario.

Your property taxes are affected by:

- •the education tax rate (set by the Province)
- •the municipal budget (established by your Municipality)
- •the municipal tax rate (set by your City/Municipality)
- your property's assessed value (determined by MPAC)

What can you do about your property taxes?

1) Prevent an increase in your municipal tax rate.

Municipal governments across Ontario are currently formulating and approving their annual budgets. Local spending decisions being made NOW will directly affect your property tax bill. Every property owner and resident should be paying attention.


NOTE: the tax bill you receive early in the calendar year is based on an INTERIM rate, but this will change, pending municipal budget decisions.

2) Challenge your MPAC assessed value.

The most recent MPAC notices showing your property's assessed value at January 1, 2016 will be issued to property owners beginning in April 2016, and will be used to determine the 4-year phased-in assessment values – starting with the 2017 taxation year.

The value to be used in 2017 can be challenged, if you commence that challenge before the RfR deadline date. To do so, you must develop a rationale as to why you believe your property has been overvalued as at January 1, 2016 – NOT what may have transpired since. Protecting Your Lake and Your Investment

Waterfronts are complicated places. The health of the lake depends on the health of the delicate shoreline area, called "the ribbon of life". The area where the shallow waters merge with the lake is an area which teems with life. Aquatic plants, insects, amphibians, fish, birds and mammals all find the shoreline useful. Shorelines can be breeding grounds, nurseries for small animals and fish, food sources, and shelter.

In addition, the shoreline acts as a natural filter and buffer, trapping and absorbing things like lawn fertilizers and pestcides. Cattails are especially important in this role. As much as 90% of living things in the lake are found along its shallow margins in the ribbon of life.

In addition, the shoreline plants act as a buffer against wind, wave and ice/water erosion. They help keep the soil intact and the water clean. This is the least expensive method of retaining your shoreline and lake water quality. Please respect the "ribbon of life".





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
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
