KIDS & NATURE

The average North American child spends less than 30 minutes playing outside each day, and more than seven hours in front of a screen. Yet research shows time outside makes children healthier, happier and smarter. We know that kids at the camp are already outdoors kids. Get outdoors with them and explore. Fresh air time vs. screen time, which is better?

You play a critical role in helping the kids in your life develop a nature habit.

Studies show time in nature can:

- Reduce stress and symptoms of attention deficit disorders
- Boost immunity, energy levels and creativity
- Increase curiosity and problemsolving ability
- Improve physical fitness and coordination
- Reduce the likelihood of needing glasses for nearsightedness

The message is clear — kids need nature! And so do parents, grandparents, caregivers and teachers.

According to a David Suzuki Foundation survey, people who



spend time outside when they're young are 20 per cent more likely to take part in outdoor programs or to explore nature on their own when they're older. And getting kids into nature will provide some of their best childhood memories.







ENVIRONMENT & FORESTRY REPORT— Bob Nikolic, Director



Greetings to all Trout Lake Campers and welcome to new summer season.

On the environmental front we have received Total Phosphorus, Calcium and Secchi disk 2016 results. You can see these results on the graphs in this Bulletin. Calcium values are pretty steady over last 6 years averaging about 2.5 mg/l (milligrams per liter) which is well above the amount required for healthy cray fish and other aquatic organism's population depending on Calcium for survival. However, while the lake average phosphorus value of 7.7µg/l (micrograms per liter) is not itself alarming, the trend in the last 3 years is somewhat worrisome. The trend line is quite steep and if it continues at that slope it would not take too many years for phosphorus values to enter the territory where a probable blue-green algal bloom would occur. Because there are so many factors, such as surface and atmospheric input, global warming/deeper thermocline, man-made pollution on the lake shore etc., influencing phosphorus values; it is very difficult to determine the main cause of the rise in phosphorus content. We know that higher water levels and increased thermocline are happening during the last few years but cannot determine how much they contribute to the increase in phosphorus. In any case, we need to remain vigilant in controlling pollution that we, the campers, may release into the water. We have not had the opportunity to further interpret the water quality survey from last year but will be looking for help on that matter.

As far as forestry is concerned we inspected the Chartrand cut on North Shore off Shaw Rd. and Lahaie cut off Owl's Nest Rd. on South Shore, and found no issues with these operations. I want to thank Brian Smith for looking after South Shore inspections. Planned harvest area maps for next winter will be, as always, available for viewing at the Picnic.

What to know about hydro power and your property (From Cottage Life with thanks)

In the last few years, there have been several stories about Ontarians going toe-to-toe with Hydro One over charges. In 2015, <u>The Globe & Mail reported</u> that the company had issued more than 100,000 faulty bills—and lied to the government to try and cover up the problem in the process. Cottages were no exception to these billing issues. In 2016, cottage owner<u>Kip Van Kempen received a bill for more than \$1,000</u>—despite the power line to his Mazinaw Lake cottage being disconnected eight months earlier when a tree fell on the power line. After the installation of a smart meter, <u>a Thunder Bay camp owner received a bill in the mail for a whopping \$6,300</u>—despite his electricity usage being seasonal. And yet another owner reported that she had to put her property up for sale <u>after paying nearly \$500 per month for an empty cottage</u>.

If you want to avoid going into battle yourself, here's what you need to know about your electricity delivery.

Know your rights

Your first step is to read through Hydro One's <u>conditions of service</u>. Next, familiarize yourself with the Ontario Energy Board (OEB)'s <u>service guidelines for electricity</u>, which dictate everything from security deposits (they're mandatory), to late payment charges (they're applied 16 days after your bill is issued) to disconnection and reconnection payments. Their website also explains how electricity is charged, and <u>provides historical data</u> to compare your own usage against.

Making a complaint

In addition to learning how to read your own meter, you should keep records of all your paperwork, including any correspondence or conversations that you have with Hydro One employees. If you have an issue or have any questions, you <u>can contact the OEB for assistance</u>. Although disagreements about the charges that appear on your bill should be brought up with your utility company first, they may be able to help you with answering questions of processing your complaint further. If you've already contacted Hydro One but don't feel that your complaint has been handled fairly (as outlined in the <u>Hydro One Complaints Process</u>), you can also contact the <u>Hydro One Ombudsperson</u>, which is an independent advocate. (Note that if the OEB is already investigating your complaint, the Hydro One Ombudsperson cannot become involved.)

Overbilling and under-billing

Two of the most common complaints are overbilling (which often happens as a result of smart meters, since usage is based on estimated readings) and unanticipated back-billing. If you have been underbilled, Hydro One can issue back bills for a maximum period of two years. Similarly, if you've been overbilled, you can request a refund for a period of up to two years. If the error isn't the result of "Hydro One's standard billing process," you're also entitled to a payment of interest.

Delivery charges

Just because you're not consuming electricity on a monthly or weekly basis doesn't mean you won't receive an electricity bill. Even if you only use your cottage seasonally, you'll still be expected to pay monthly delivery charges for electricity as well as HST.

What to do if you lose energy

When the power goes out, call Hydro One's province-wide power outage hotline at 1-800-434-1235. When it comes to billing though, Hydro One is not liable for any damages (including financial losses) caused by power interruptions or voltage irregularities, unless they are damages cause by their negligence of willful misconduct.

FISHERY REPORT—Brian Smith



Remembering Jean-Yves

We knew that something had changed at Grant Shaw's camp when in the winter of 2008/2009 the lights were on in the evening. Grant spent his winters in Florida and he wasn't there, so our first guess was that he had sold the camp. Not long after we got the word that this was true and that some couple from "down south" bought the place. Once the spring arrived and water got warmer we noticed that very early every dry morning a lone canoe paddler would paddle along south shore and occasionally cut across the lake for a ride along north shore. Our contacts on south shore told us that the place was purchased by a French couple, both retired teachers, who were living close to Windsor. In the meantime Ljuba and I were discussing how to approach them and ask them to join our Association.

One morning I was busy in the house while Ljuba was doing some work around the

dock. After a while when I looked out the window I saw this canoeist parked by our dock and talking to Ljuba· A few minutes later he left and Ljuba came in to tell me that the camper's name is Jean-Yves Losier and that he stopped to tell us that he and his wife Juliette want to join TLCASD. It is a rare occasion that new campers actively seek to join, most of the time someone, usually neighbours, approach them and explain how beneficial Association is for all campers. Not long after this visit we met Jean-Yves and Juliette and discovered that their original plan was to build a retirement home on French River and bought Grant's place to see if it could be renovated and perhaps later sold. Both were very environmentally



inclined and after only few weeks spent on the lake they realized how beautiful Trout Lake is and with very clean water. Needless to say they fell, like so many of us, in love with the lake and the idea of retirement camp changed to idea of retirement home on Trout Lake. Even though both Jean-Yves and Juliette were very busy improving their property, Jean-Yves joined the Board of Directors in 2010 and not long after Juliette became a member of Auditing Committee. It would be difficult to find harder working people than Jean-Yves and Juliette. This did not prevent them to have a fine sense of humour, Jean-Yves would often say, when being introduced, "I am a Loser with an "I", alluding to his family name - Lozier". Their contribution to TLCASD since 2009, either helping at every Picnic or organising the Fish Fry put them at the level that many of us could not match. Then suddenly, their lives got turned upside down when Jean-Yves was diagnosed with a dreaded illness. It was the most difficult time of his and Juliette's life but they used it to renew ties with a large extended family and sharing precious moments with daughters, sons-in-law and grandchildren. And, when the end was so painfully near Jean-Yves asked to spend a few days on his beloved lake. Even the weather co-operated, it was unusually warm during those few days.

Jean-Yves invaluable contribution to the Association was his ability to smooth conflicts, bring opposing views to compromise and a happy ending, all the while never raising his voice. That is how I will remember Jean-Yves.



HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK ALONE

This is really important for everyone to know!

Let's say it's 7:25pm and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job. You're really tired, upset and frustrated.

Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up in to your jaw. You are only about five km from the hospital nearest your home. Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.

You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.

HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.

However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously.. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the

heart is felt to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood cir-

culating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm.

In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.

Tell as many other people as possible about this. It could save their lives!

A cardiologist says If everyone who gets this email, & kindly sends it to 10 people, you can bet that we'll save at least one life.

We'd like to welcome the new owners of Silv'ry Moon Lodge to the lake. They sent this little note for me to share with campers:



Don't "P" on Your Lawn! Phosphorus (P) is a nutrient found in many fertilizers that feeds algae blooms in lakes. Switch to P-free fertilizers and pick up a "Healthy Lawn Tips" brochure here. LOOK FOR THE ZERO! The three numbers on fertilizer bags show the nitrogen-phosphorus potassium (N-P-K) nutrient analysis. The middle number is the phosphate (phosphorus) content. A "zero" in the middle means it is phosphorus-free. Most lawns only need nitrogen to stay healthy!

Algal blooms or clear, safe water. Your choices will make a difference!








"SUMMERIZE" YOUR BOAT

Well it is here, SPRING has arrived and with it comes summer. There is no better time to think about SUMMERIZING YOUR BOAT. There are many things to consider when getting your boat ready for summer. First is the visual inspection. Go around and look at the complete boat, hull, transom keel and bow. Once you have inspected and cleaned the boat (fast clean hull wash is a good product to clean the bottom of your boat and or pontoons) and motor. You may also inspect your horn and navigation lights .

After a good inspection is done and you are satisfied that there is no damage, you may proceed to summerize the engine. First you need to connect the battery (electric start models) make sure your battery is fully charged, a week battery can cause many problems.

Now there are several things to consider. Number one you want to make sure you have fresh gas if your tank is empty or if you did not stabilize your fuel in the fall. Next you want to check the oil (four stroke models and oil injected models only). If you have a four stroke and did not change the oil in the fall, now would be a good time to inspect the oil and do an oil change if needed.

After you have completed the oil change, you move on to the lower unit gear lube. If you did not drain in the fall, this is a good time to notice if there are any foreign materials in the oil such as water (oil will be a milky color) or metal shavings. If you find any of these in the oil it means it is time to have your lower unit serviced.

When all is done it is also a good time to wash the engine thoroughly. Look for any damage to the prop and the lower unit. This may be time to have your skeg repaired and send your prop to be repaired by a good qualified prop repair shop.

If at any time this becomes a bit much for you, you may always go to a processional for a full summerizing of your boat and motor.


