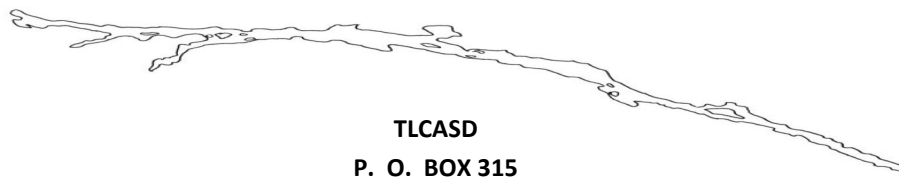

Starting summer off with a bang!

Early season pike fishing can be the best time to land that monster pike you've been dreaming of (even though you told your significant other you were dreaming of them). That's because big pike that cruise open water during the summer, spend their springs in the shallows, which makes locating them much easier (polarized glasses are a must). Look for shallow weedy areas, but be careful on approach as these temperamental fish will be very moody and easy to spook this time of year. Once you've located your target, the real fun begins. I recommend trying to get the beast to bite by using one of three lure types. First, the spinnerbait. This is the fast-food bait for Pike; a very easy meal that requires little effort. With its flash and vibration, the pike will surely think it's just heard the dinner bell ring. Insider info: keep the spinnerbait light in weight to counter the shallow waters. Second, the classic spoon. Spoons have been around for a long time and that's because they catch fish—plain and simple. The famous Red Devil, Five of Diamonds or the Williams Wobbler should all do the trick. Insider info: if a fish follows your lure but refuses to bite, stop mid-way through the retrieve and let the spoon flutter downward, that should be enough to convince the pike that it's hungry. Third, is the shallow body swimbait. Using this bait isn't for the faint of heart as a slow retrieve is best, and patience is a must. Slight twitches, even completely stopping the bait when you have the fish's attention will work wonders. Insider info: use light equipment when casting this bait (line and leader) to stop it from sinking too quickly. Once you've decided on your weapon of choice, cast well in front of the fish and let the fish's actions tell you what it likes and doesn't like.

A note on conservation. If you're like us at the Fishery Committee, a healthy fish population for future generations to enjoy is very important to you too. Although we can legally keep 1 or 2 pike over 24 inches in length, it is generally considered standard procedure within the fishing community to release all pike over 27 inches. If too many large pike are harvested, the lake could end up with a population of 'stunted' pike. These are pike that have had to compete with each other their whole lives and mature earlier, thus never reaching 'large' size. This results in a pike population of all small to medium size pike. This has happened with many lakes in Northern Ontario that still haven't recovered, and maybe never will. Thanks for your thought and consideration on this important topic.

Purple Loosestrife Prevention and Control

NOTE: This invasive plant has been seen in several areas around Trout Lake. Please check your property and destroy it as outlined below.

Purple loosestrife is a very hardy perennial, which can rapidly degrade wetlands, diminishing their value for wildlife habitat. Wetlands are the most biologically diverse, productive component of our ecosystem. Hundreds of species of plants, birds, mammals, reptiles, insects, fish and amphibians rely on healthy wetland habitat for their survival. However, when purple loosestrife gets a foothold, the habitat where fish and wildlife feed, seek shelter, reproduce and rear young, quickly becomes choked under a sea of purple flowers. Areas...where fish spawn, are degraded. An estimated 190,000 hectares of wetlands, marshes, pastures and riparian meadows are affected in North America each year, with an economic impact of millions of dollars.

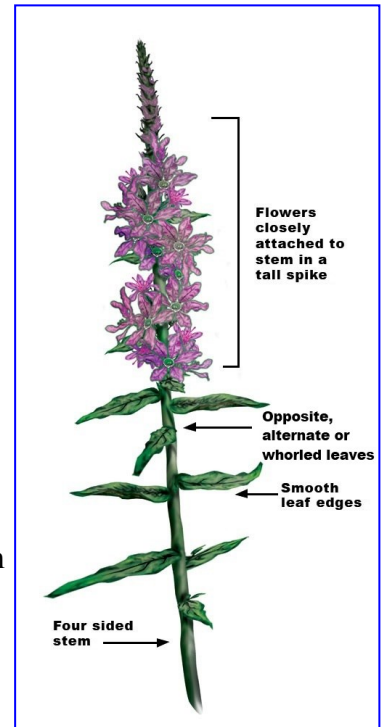
The best time to stop the spread of purple loosestrife is late June, July and into early August. During this time plants are flowering and easily recognizable and have yet to go to seed. Removing the plant once the seeds have developed may cause further spread as the seeds fall off the plant during removal.

When removing purple loosestrife, it is important to make sure the entire root mass, and all the pieces, are removed. Roots can reach 30 cm (1 foot) or deeper into the soil. Since purple loosestrife can re-establish from just pieces of the plants, care should be taken when digging it out. Once removed, place the plant in a black garbage bag and let it dry completely. Placing the bag in a hot, sunny location will speed up this process.

Once the plant is dried out it may be burned, where permitted, or placed for disposal in the landfill. Make sure to burn the plants completely, or double bag them to avoid contaminating landfill sites. The removal area should be monitored the next growing season and beyond because there will be a seed bank remaining in the soil.

Removing purple loosestrife from wetland areas is not easy. Herbicides cannot be used in many of the areas where purple loosestrife is found.

Editor's Note: The Association will be applying for a grant to bring in some experts on Purple Loosestrife to help identify it and provide education to our members.

How Lake Ice Melts

A wonderful description of how lake ice melts:

1. In the late fall, the lake loses heat to the atmosphere, and then on a day or night when the wind is not blowing, ice forms. The ice gets thicker as long as the lake can continue to lose heat.
2. In most Januaries and Februaries, snow both reflects sunlight and insulates the lake. With a thick snow layer, the lake neither gains nor loses heat. The bottom sediment is actually heating the lake water slightly over the winter, from stored summer heat.
3. Around March, as the air warms and the sun gets more intense, the snow melts, allowing light to penetrate the ice. Because the ice acts like the glass in a greenhouse, the water beneath it begins to warm, and the ice begins to melt FROM THE BOTTOM.
4. When the ice thickness erodes to between 4 and 12 inches, it transforms into long vertical crystals called "candles." These conduct light even better, so the ice starts to look black, because it is not reflecting much sunlight.
5. Warming continues because the light energy is being transferred to the water below the ice. Meltwater fills in between the crystals, which begin breaking apart. The surface appears grayish as the ice reflects a bit more light than before.
6. The wind comes up, and breaks the surface apart. The candles will often be blown to one side of the lake, making a tinkling sound as they knock against one another, and piling up on the shore. In hours, a sparkling blue lake, once again!

This year our never-ending winter resulted in the lake ice melting on May 10th!



The Rules for Off-Road Vehicles (ATVs) on Roads—Greater Sudbury Police Services

Driver/Passenger Requirements:

- Driver must be at least 16 years of age and hold a valid G2, M2 licence or greater.
- Driver must carry the registration permit of the off-road vehicle or a true copy, and the vehicle must be plated.
- The vehicle shall be insured.
- No passengers under the age of 8.
- Driver and passengers must wear an approved motorcycle helmet securely fastened under the chin by the chin strap
- Drivers and passengers on a side-by-side off-road vehicle must occupy a seating position with a seat belt which must be worn properly.
- Passengers on a factory built two-up all-terrain vehicle must be able to reach and use the foot-rests.
- Passengers are not allowed on after-market two-up seats.

Dirt bikes, Argos, Three-wheelers and All-terrain vehicles with more than four wheels are not allowed on streets.

Speed Limits for Off-Road Vehicles on Streets

- Posted speed limit of 50 km/h or less for motor vehicles = maximum speed of 20 km/h for off-road vehicles
- Posted speed limit greater than 50 km/h for motor vehicles = maximum speed of 50 km/h for off-road vehicles

Off-Road Vehicle Act Offences (not on roadways)

- No owner of an off-road vehicle shall permit a child under the age of 12 to drive the vehicle, unless they are on land occupied by the vehicle owner, or under the close supervision of an adult.
- Owners of off-road vehicles may be held liable for injury and damages in addition to the driver. The owner may also be charged and convicted of an offence under this Act, the regulations or any municipal by-law regulating, governing or prohibiting the operation of off-road vehicles, for which the driver of the off-road vehicle is subject to be charged and on conviction, the owner is liable to the penalty prescribed for the offence.
- Off-road vehicles shall be issued a permit and be plated.
- No person shall drive an off-road vehicle unless it is insured under a Motor Vehicle Liability Policy in accordance with the Insurance Act. The owner will not allow the off-road vehicle to be operated without insurance.
- Every person who drives an off-road vehicle without due care and attention or without reasonable consideration for other persons is guilty of an offence.
- Every person who has been signaled to stop by a person authorized to do so (peace officer, property owner, etc.) shall stop immediately and identify themselves.
- No person shall drive an off-road vehicle or ride on an off-road vehicle or ride on a conveyance towed by an off-road vehicle unless he or she is wearing a helmet that complies with the regulations, securely fastened under his or her chin with a chin strap.

**ENVIRONMENT &
FORESTRY REPORT—**
Bob Nikolic, Director



Greetings to all campers and welcome to the 2018 camp season. Thanks to the wonders of the internet I, although not being here, knew that the past winter was brutal. When we came home by the end of March it looked pretty good until April came and with it more snow, cold and generally miserable weather. However, the summer has arrived at the lake, it's the end of May and 30 C outside.

Update on environment: For some reason the 2017 results from our lake water samples have not been released by Lake Partner Ontario. They are normally posted in February so this is quite unusual. In mid-April I sent an email inquiring about this but did not receive any answer. Some time ago in their Newsletter Lake Partner Ontario explained that results will not be released until after the election??? I cannot see any connection between phosphorus results and election but the government obviously did. The kit for 2018 sampling has arrived and by the time you read this we will be done with the sampling. This year FOCA is offering grants for work on invasive species and I proposed we apply for a grant to survey the entire lake for Purple Loosestrife (I am aware that it is spreading in the lake) and follow up with an eradication program. Part of this will be involving camp owners in front of those properties where the plant occurs and organizing groups to eradicate it on other places on the lake. We may hire an expert on this, but I am very familiar with the plant and could show the people how to recognize it. Bringing a FOCA invasive species person would help anyone who is not sure about recognition and eradication issues. Debbie, our President has applied for the grant and we hope to carry out this project at no cost to TLCASD.

Update on Forestry: Mike Lahaie from Alban has done a forest harvest in the area from power line to Moose creek on both sides of Shaw road. Kim and Paul Fyfe have been inspecting the cuts and did not see anything that would raise our concern. We still plan to have a final inspection checking for actual buffer zones, garbage etc. We will also get involved with next Five-year Harvest Plan (2020 – 2025) this year. In addition, there will be a tour of areas sprayed with herbicide last year to see how good control of “drift”, (the spray falling outside of intended area) was achieved. This tour will take place after the AGM and it'll be very interesting to see and hear about that activity.

In closing, I would like to let you know that I will not be running for Director Environment and Forestry at the AGM. It is time for some new and younger blood in this position. In order to have a smooth transition I will stay as a member of both Environment and Forestry Committee and do my best to offer support to new Director when we get one.

DROWNING LOOKS DIFFERENT THAN ON TV

If you spend time on or near the water (hint: that's all of us), then you should make sure that you and your crew know what to look for when people enter the water. Drowning is almost always a deceptively quiet event. The waving, splashing and yelling that dramatic conditioning (television) prepares us to look for is rarely seen in real life. The Instinctive Drowning Response, so named by Francesco A. Pia, Ph.D., is what people do to avoid actual or perceived suffocation in the water. And it does not look like most people expect it to. When someone is drowning there is very little splashing, and no waving or yelling or calling for help of any kind. To get an idea of just how quiet and undramatic drowning can be, consider this: It is the number two cause of accidental death in children age 15 and under (just behind vehicle accidents). Of the approximately 750 children who will drown next year, about 375 of them will do so within 25 yards of a parent or other adult. In 10 percent of those drownings, the adult will actually watch them do it, having no idea it is happening.

Drowning does not look like drowning. Dr. Pia, in an article he wrote for the Coast Guard's *On Scene* magazine, described the instinctive drowning response like this: Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The respiratory system was designed for breathing. Speech is a secondary or overlaid function. Breathing must be fulfilled before speech occurs.

Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale, inhale or call out for help. When the drowning people's mouths are above the surface, they exhale and inhale quickly as their mouths start to sink below the surface of the water.

Drowning people cannot wave for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths out of the water to breathe.

Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response, drowning people cannot voluntarily control their arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment.

From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response, people’s bodies remain upright in the water, with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs. (Source: *On Scene* magazine: Fall 2006 page 14)

This doesn’t mean that a person who is yelling for help and thrashing isn’t in real trouble — they are experiencing aquatic distress. Not always present before the instinctive drowning response, aquatic distress doesn’t last long, but unlike true drowning, these victims can still assist in their own rescue. They can grab lifelines, reach for throw rings, etc.

Look for these other signs of drowning when persons are in the water:

Head low in the water, mouth at water level

Head tilted back with mouth open

Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus

Eyes closed

Hair over forehead or eyes

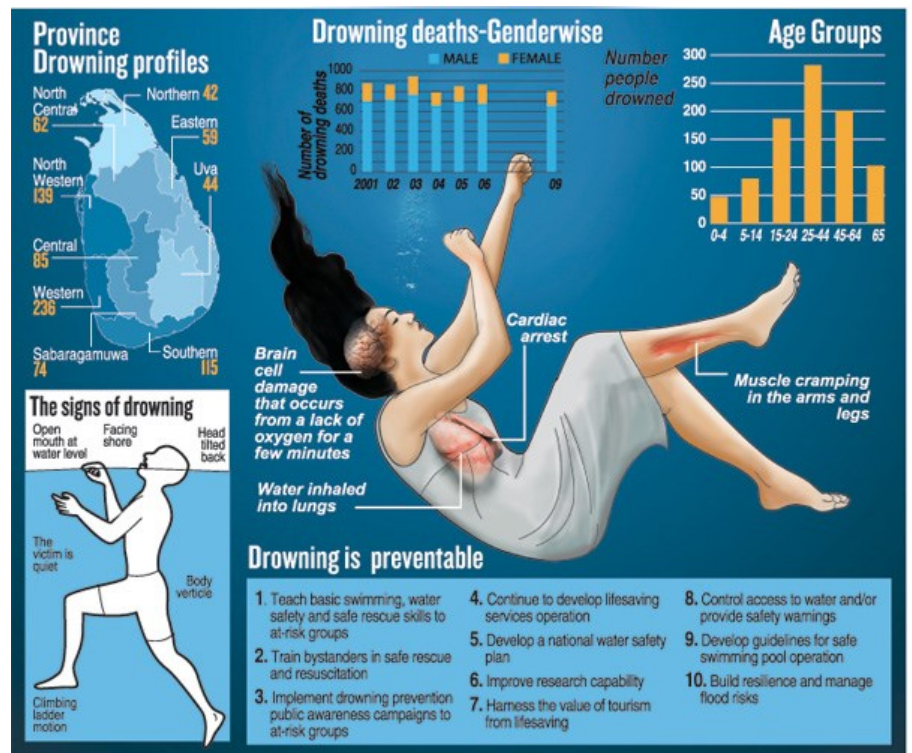
Not using legs

Hyperventilating or gasping

Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway

Trying to roll over onto the back

Appears to be climbing an invisible ladder

So, if a someone falls overboard and everything looks okay, don’t be too sure. Sometimes the most common indication that someone is drowning is that they don’t look as if they’re drowning. They may just look as if they are treading water and looking up at the deck. One way to be sure? Ask them, “Are you alright?” If they can answer at all, they probably are. If they return a blank stare, you may have less than 30 seconds to get to them. And parents — **children playing in the water make noise. When they get quiet, you need to get to them and find out why.**

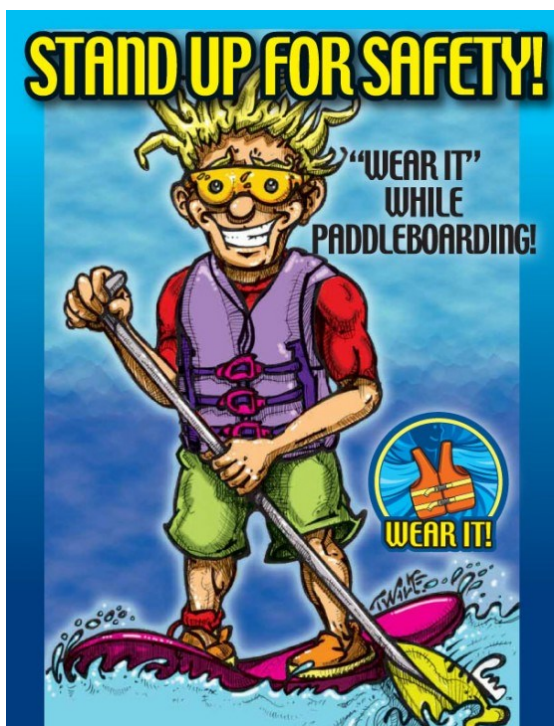

Campers please remember that the fire pumps are there for your use in-case of an emergency. Please make sure you are familiar with, and know how to operate the pump closest to your camp.

On May 18th we had a sauna burn down on the North Shore. The fire pump from the Chicquen camp was picked up and used. The pump ran well and fortunately got the job done but there were some complications with the plastic hose. The Safety Committee is looking into better hose - something that will not kink as easily and restrict the pressure. If you are familiar with this problem or have any suggestions, please let me know.

This is a reminder about labeling your boat at Dodd Lake. We are pursuing doing a cleanup and removing the boats that are not accounted for. Please have your name and phone number printed clearly on the boat. Many boats have not been used, are derelict and some are submerged in the water. 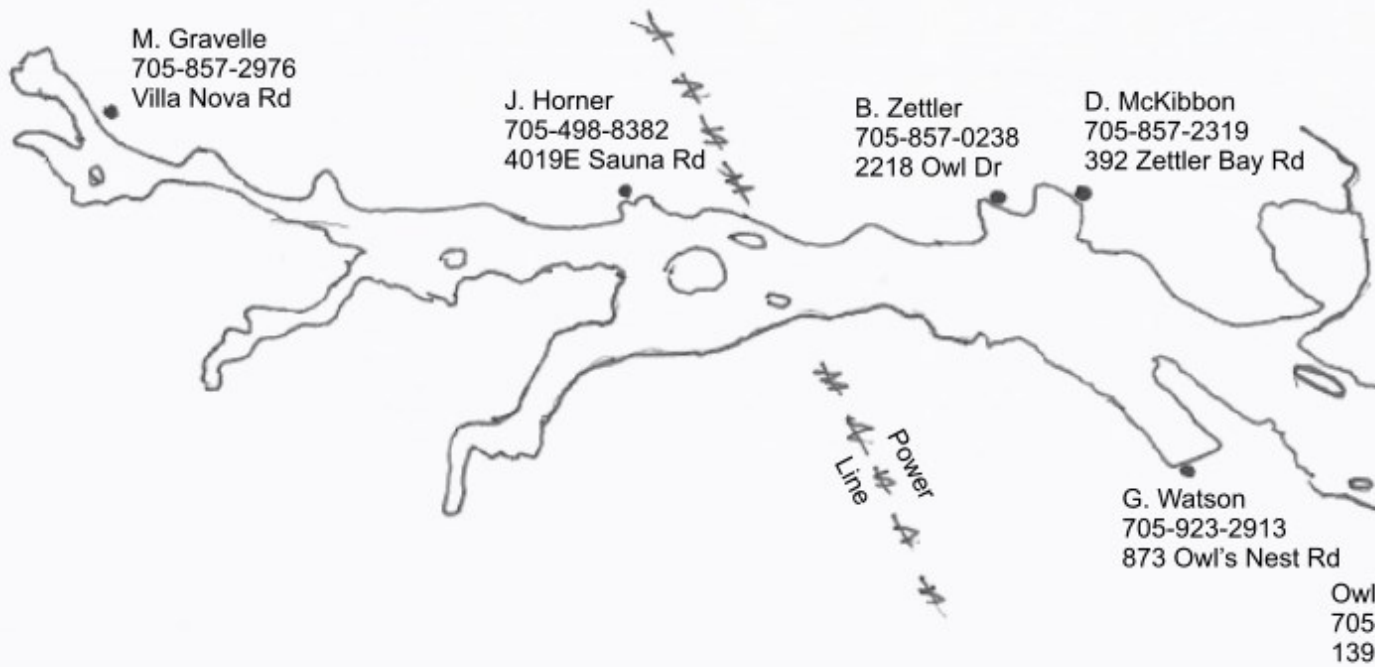

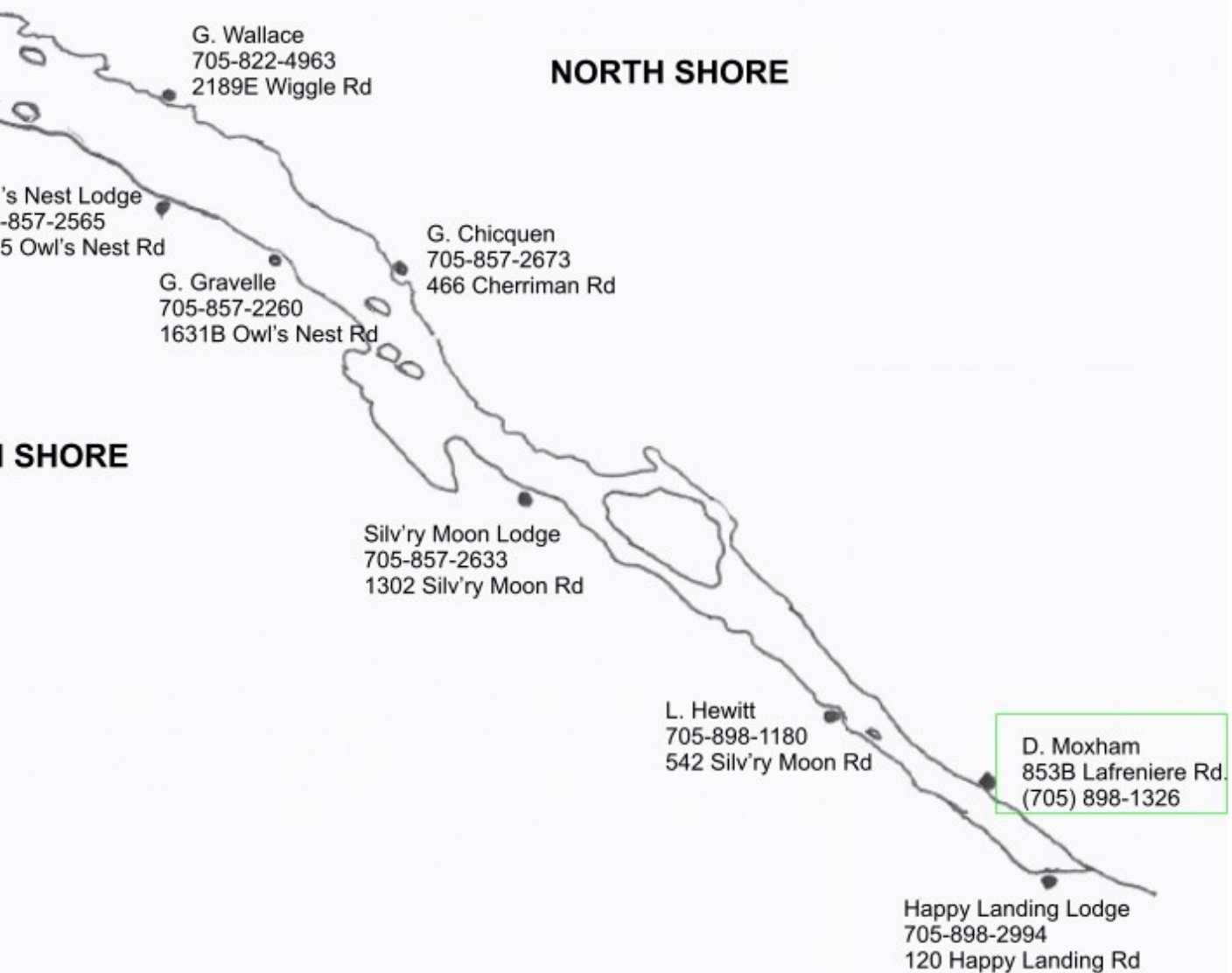

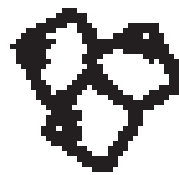
● FIRE PUMP LOCATIONS

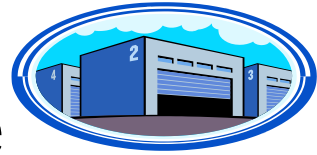

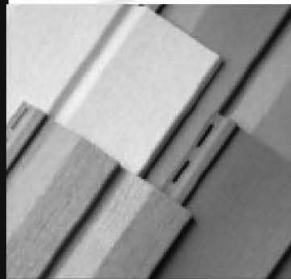
