#### **Lake Development & Review Committee Report**

# Re: Appeal of Bylaw Amendment Decision - Municipality of French River and Launch of Fund-Raising Campaign #SaveTroutLake

This report is to advise that following an intense, passionate, and emotional meeting at Council on September 15th, we were unsuccessful at having the bylaw amendment voted down. Unfortunately, our arguments were dismissed by the Planner and others at the meeting who stated that this was a "general bylaw amendment", while our concerns were with a specific property. We repeatedly argued that the effect of the general amendment would have significant effects on Trout Lake, due to an ongoing development, and indeed many places in French River.

Trout Lakers stood up and were heard. There were 60 letters submitted opposing the bylaw amendment, 1083 people or more signed the petition, and 10 people made well-reasoned presentations to Council objecting to the bylaw, most in-person. Many campers submitted emails to me, phoned for clarification of the issues, and in general voiced their support. I want to thank every one of you for your participation and support in this process.

Council acknowledged our passion to protect Trout Lake and agreed some aspects of the bylaw need more work. They have put in 5 years of work into writing the Trailer Licensing By-law and (perhaps) 6 months into the definition of Park Model Trailers (PMT). It was obvious they really need to be able to license and inspect trailers to ensure environmental and bylaw compliance, and this was Council's focus in getting the bylaw passed. Councillors acknowledged more work was needed in the PMT definition, but they passed it anyway.

I feel Council made a very short-sighted decision. Council could have opted to go back and revise the PMT definition, filling in the areas where more clarity was needed, but they chose not to. This would have been a much quicker, less costly solution for everyone involved. Now they have to wait for the appeal to occur, hire lawyers, everything is frozen in place and they can't implement their bylaw anyway.

We had 20 days to submit an Appeal which we have done. The Board of Directors has agreed with the Lake Review & Development Committee recommendation that we go forward and submit an appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal (formerly called LPAT). We have hired a lawyer who specializes in municipal matters to represent us. The application fee is \$1,100, and there is the possibility of applying to have the fee reduced to \$400. Unfortunately, there will be significant legal fees and costs going forward. We anticipate we will need \$10,000 to fund this appeal.


#### SAFETY REPORT—Joel Desmarais

Happy Fall Fellow Campers,

I hope everyone has been enjoying the great weather we have been having this fall. Thank you to all the volunteers who help with the markers, lights and fire pumps. Your continued efforts are greatly appreciated. If any of our members would like to volunteer to assist with markers and general lake safety in the future please do not hesitate to contact me. We are always looking for new volunteers to assist. If there are boaters on the water before winter freeze please be careful without the markers. We also encourage all members to familiarize themselves with the designated pump locations on our lake for emergency purposes.

With every passing winter it feels like more and more of us are spending time at our camps and properties year round. What a wonderful thing to see! With winter approaching I would like to take the time to remind all of our members to please always check for safe ice conditions as the lake begins to freeze. Remind your children of the dangers of being around the water this time of year and protect your pets from wandering out onto unsafe ice. Over the last couple of years ice conditions have rarely been safe before New Years. Ice may be safe on one area of the lake but may not be in another. Safety Guidelines recommend minimum ice thickness of 4" for walking, 5"-6" for a snowmobile and 8-12" for a car or small pickup truck, however no ice is ever 100% safe.

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#### Winterizing your Cottage

It's that bittersweet time of year, when the fall leaves are glorious and we have to think about closing up our cottages or at least preparing for winter. This means summer toys get put away, the woodpile gets stacked ready for burning, leaves get raked, and so on.

If your cottage isn't heated over the winter, don't forget to remove items which don't take well to freezing. These include canned food, beverages like pop which can explode, paint and cleaning products.

Don't leave things like bird seed in your shed (ask me why!) My shed has a squirrel sized hole chewed through the door, as it was determined to get in to the seed I left in there one year. Remove any garbage or other animal attractants before closing for the winter. Dryer sheets help repel mice.

#### Healthy Shorelines – the 'How' and 'Why' by Terry Rees


Waterfront property owners are fortunate to be able to enjoy such a legacy of healthy freshwater resources across this great province of ours. We also share responsibility as people who steward the land, and that need to look out for the long-term sustainability and health of our lakes and our shore lands.

A healthy shoreline is a natural shoreline; leaving the existing native trees and shrubs intact supports healthy fish and wildlife populations and better water quality. Augment Mother Nature's existing work with some native plants, and allow it to fill in over time. A variety of native plants allows for so many important life processes to take place along your shoreline: the spawning of fish and aquatic insects that feed them, habitat and cover for frogs and turtles and so many of the critters that are signs of a thriving and healthy lake or river.

A sustainable property will have a good buffer of natural plants right along the shore's edge, but can still enjoy some clear areas well back from the water, where kids can run and play. But right at the water's edge, aim for a selection of shrubbery, rocks, fallen logs, grasses, small trees, and natural debris. In addition to being great habitat, this protects the water quality and prevents shoreline erosion due to deep and varying root depths. If much of your property is lawn leading straight to the water, you may have problems with geese which invade manicured area and leave behind a mess everywhere. A barrier of natural habitat right at the shore's edge discourages geese from landing here or moving up further onto the property.



#### ENVIRONMENT & FORESTRY REPORT



#### TAKE CARE OF THE ENVIRONMENT AND EVERYTHING ELSE WILL BE TAKEN CARE OF

Please help keep our lake and lands clean.

Guy Springgay—Depth (Secchi) readings have been now been published from the Lake Partners Program. Average reading in 2020 for the 6 sites along the lake, taken twice (spring and late summer) have

gone up to a depth clarity of 4 metres compared to 3.3 in 2019 and 3.9 in 2018. See attached graph. The Secchi readings were done again in May this year and depth readings are again favourable.

We did not do phosphorous and calcium testing in 2020 as the lab did not open until September 2020 due to CoVid. We do these chemical tests in the spring and we have taken the 6 samples for 2021 and have sent to Lake Partners.

The Board has approved doing additional new sampling for E.Coli Chlorophyll A, and Total Coliforms which were planned for the fall of this year at various locations closer to the shore. Samples will be sent to a private testing lab in Sudbury.


This time of year is the best time to cut off the stalk of purple loosestrife, below the flowers. If you find some growing on your property try your best to dig it out by the roots. If this is not possible, cut off the stalk below the flowers, put it in a green garbage bag and leave it out in the sun for a few days. Do not compost this plant. For more details see information on our web site.

Ed. Note: Due to time constraints the additional sampling program will commence next year. The new Environment & Forestry Director is developing some guidelines and a plan to establish more water quality testing programs for next year.

In addition, research is ongoing regarding the special protections which are mandated to help protect lake trout populations in lakes such as ours.

#### Summer 2021 Forestry Update—Bob Nikolic

As most of the Trout Lakers know, the forest harvest in one km zone around the lake is permitted from October Thanksgiving weekend to 1<sup>st</sup> of May the following year. Some preparatory work such as roads upgrades may be done ahead of the harvest period and some log hauling may occur following the end of harvest period. The hauling is always done before the thaw renders bush roads unusable. The planned harvest is released in the spring by issuing AWS (Annual Work Schedule which is the joint effort by VFM and NDMNRF (new name) with Ministry approving the schedule. This coming harvest season will have Lahaie lumber harvest their Block 20-074 which stretches along Shaw road from the power line to Lac Lachapele to the west close to Edith Lake road. Most of the block is located north of Shaw Road with small parts south of the road. These parts were harvested in previous years and this season harvest will be on the north side of Shaw road.

They circle the cabin, weave a fabric of luminescent threads to hold back the brooding forest, the darkness, the nightmares, leave space for only dreams to pass.







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
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#### **New Landfill Hours**

On an experimental basis, the municipality has closed access to its blue bins located in Noelville on the days when the landfill is open. As it's only about one km down the road (turn on Houle Road, near the OPP Station), please take your garbage there. The Shaw Road and Alban bins remain open.

Monday—8 a.m.—12 noon Tuesday—Closed Wednesday—7 a.m. –n 5 p.m. Thursday—7 a.m.—5 p.m. Friday—12 noon – 5 p.m. Saturday—7 a.m.—5 p.m. Sunday—Closed

Note: There is no tipping fee for tires without rims.

In addition, there is a new By-Law Enforcement Officer monitoring activity at the blue bin sites to ensure compliance with the rules. Construction materials and large items should be taken directly to the landfill, not put in the bins.

#### **FOREST FIRES**

Due to the drought this spring and early summer, forest fires became a top of mind issue. Smoke was visible and MNRF scout planes and water bombers were in the area frequently.

There were several forest fires in the vicinity of Trout Lake, including two near Judge Lake, one in Estaire, one near Dodd Lake and one very near to Zettler Bay Road. This fire was particularly worrying to campers along that road, and the whole lake. Fire fighters camped out in one of our members' driveways and were brought by boat closer to the fire location. Sharp eyed campers on the south shore spotted the lightning strike and resulting fire and called it in immediately. Here is a photo of Paul Fyfe standing next to the tree which got hit. Due to the quick work of everyone, this fire did not become a disaster and was put out in about four days.

Everyone should familiarize themselves with our fire pump locations and learn how to use the pumps.
